COURSE SYLLABUS

Constitutional Law II - Section 217 D- Fall 2008

This Course Syllabus presents an overview of the material that will be covered in Constitutional Law II, which generally addresses the role of individual rights and liberties under the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. The total number of pages is approximately 600, averaging 20-something pages per class session. **Generally, this pace is designed to emphasize quality over quantity**. Some of these materials will be covered in depth and some not, depending on the complexity and importance of the material, or on the progression of the class as a whole. However, **for exam purposes, all students are responsible for all assigned readings, including the "Notes & Problems" that are presented between the cases.** Use this Syllabus to read ahead or to anticipate future readings, but remember that assignments are governed by class announcements and that you must ascertain missed information for any days you are absent. You may also want to consider using this Syllabus as a general outline to help you structure your own study outline for the final exam, noting that the first half of the course is devoted to Equal Protection and the second half to Due Process.
