Summer Course "Critical Theory of Law and Social Justice in the Americas"

December 15, 2021

Between January 21 and 28, 2022, the course **Critical Theory of Law and Social Justice in the Americas will be held, organized by the Faculty** of Law of the Alberto Hurtado University, with the collaboration of Latina and Latino Critical Legal Theory (LatCrit), the Millennium Institute for Research on Violence and Democracy (VioDemos), Cornell University, University of Miami, University of Pittsburgh, Inter-American University of Puerto Rico, Catholic University of Uruguay, University of Florida, National University of Tucumán, Ibero-American University of Dominican Republic, Institute of Latina/o, Caribbean, and Latin American Studies of the University of Connecticut and the Latin American Faculty of Social Sciences (FLACSO-Chile).

It is a free, interdisciplinary, transnational, online and intergenerational course. The list of people enrolled in the course can be found $\underline{\text{here}}$. Participants will receive a Certificate of Participation to the extent that they attend more than 80% of the sessions and answer a questionnaire at the end of the course, referring to its main contents. The purpose of the course is to reflect on various contemporary critical theories that offer innovative views of social and legal phenomena of the utmost importance in current times, such as the rights of indigenous peoples, the rights of migrants, feminist theory of law, human rights and transitional justice, the rights of sexual minorities, etc. In addition, the practical workshops will allow participants to learn how to develop strategies and action plans to organize initiatives that contribute to social justice in their own localities. The course program also includes modules to understand case studies and contingent situations of public interest.

From a methodological point of view, it is an intensive full-time course, since participants must allocate time to prepare the required readings and then attend the online sessions. The conferences of the teaching team will be recorded, to be later transcribed and published in a collective book. Participants must have a personal computer with Internet access during the course, including a microphone, camera, and speakers. In this first version of the summer course, the sessions will preferably be in Spanish.
